Every Cat Deserves

A Chance at a Safe, Loving Home

Our mission is to continue saving as many cats and kittens as we can every year until there is no more unnecessary euthanasia in the Triangle and Eastern North Carolina. That is why we expanded our shelter and clinic in 2020 so we could help more animals and people.

As our lifesaving programs increase, we continue our work to reduce unnecessary euthanasia in the Triangle. National organization Best Friends recognized our continued 90% save rate, a number that is closer to 100% as we provide quality care for the cats who come to SAFE Haven. Everyday is a step closer to a more positive outcome for cats who enter traditional shelters.

We served 14,834 people with animals in 2022/2023 through all of our programs. That's a 10% increase from our previous year.

In the SAFE Care Clinic, we have increased our surgeries by 29% since last year and adoptions at SAFE Haven have increased by 6%. We fed 1,678 cats and dogs through our Pet Food Pantry last year with over 30,000 pounds of food.



Where The Cats In The Shelter Came From

We partner with traditional (usually County) animal shelters. In the 13 counties that surround Wake, we focus our work with shelters that have the greatest need to transfer cats and kittens, so they do not have to be euthanized.

How Long Does It Take The Cats To Get Adopted Once They Come To SAFE Haven?



Our cats, on average, only stay at the shelter for 3.5 weeks. Several years ago, this was about 8 weeks. This is really amazing considering these are all stray, abandoned, injured, or orphaned cats and kittens. We often do not have any idea of their condition when we agree to take them. This year, 28 cats we rescued were over 7 years old. The oldest kitty we took was Phyllicia at 15 years, 1 month.

Thanks to our expansion in 2020 we have been able to increase our capacity at the clinic and keep our fees as low as possible. We are also able to offer free services to anyone who needs them, so we do not have to turn anyone away from the clinic and risk other kittens being born.

Who Are These Cats (And Dogs!)?

They came from 58 counties in North Carolina. The farthest drove from Asheville (248 miles, one way). Why? Because there are only a handful of clinics like ours in the entire state.

Helping Our Community

We sterilized 2,383 cats and kittens as a vital service to 17 rescue groups and humane societies in the Triangle so they will never have to adopt unsterilized animals.

We sterilized 2,955 feral or community cats who now will not be having kittens.
